### PRAY & PRAISE THEE WITHOUT CEASING ...



The winds of Pentecost blow through June and I think of this as the (almost) summer breezes blow across the garden. The days are warmer, although some consistency in the weather would be good. As the longest day approaches on 21<sup>st</sup>. "*Ne'er cast a clout 'til May be out*", might need amendment.

For those interested in the church's calendar, the 4<sup>th</sup> June is Trinity Sunday when we honour that mystery which is Father, Son and Holy Spirit. Then we enter "Ordinary something called Time", which lasts until Advent, This really just means that we aren't either celebrating or Faster preparing for or Christmas. The altar dressings and vestments are Green during this time except for feast days, which may be Red or Gold. June includes Corpus Christi (8<sup>th</sup> June), the birth of John the Baptist (24<sup>th</sup> June) and Saints Peter and Paul (29<sup>th</sup> June).

But the next "Red" day for us is the feast of St Barnabas, which we celebrate on Sunday 11<sup>th</sup> June. The story of Barnabas appears in Acts, when he goes to the church at Antioch and we are told;

"When he arrived and saw what the grace of God had done, he was glad and encouraged them all to remain true to the Lord with all their hearts." (Acts 11:23)

After Pentecost we hear of the disciples travelling to spread the good news of the gospel, which is also a time for us to think

about mission and discipleship, and about who and what we pray for. In church, St Barnabas looks out at us from the window to the left of the high altar, in his green and purple robes, and when I pray intercessions. I ask for his encouragement. We have just had our APCM; an opportunity to review last year and consider what we do next. We should acknowledge and celebrate what we have, praising God, just as Barnabas did for that early church at Antioch. It's also important that what we do is underpinned prayer for bv quidance and action.

During the nine days between Ascension and Pentecost, some of you may have been praying the Novena, where we name five people who we hope will come to know the love of God, and prav for them each day. As we think about our mission to "Prioritise. Capitalise and Revitalise" at St Barnabas and Christ Church. vou might consider continuing to pray for those people. Our praver chain still meets monthly and we often discuss how much there is to pray for. If we're not careful it can become overwhelming with everything that goes on in the world, but what is important is that we do pray, always remembering to praise God. Here is a sneak preview of the collect for St Barnabas' day, which could be useful at any time.

Bountiful God, giver of all gifts, who poured your Spirit upon your servant Barnabas and gave him grace to encourage others: help us, by his example, to be generous in our judgements and unselfish in our service; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen.

My title comes from the second verse of, "Love divine, all loves excelling; pray and praise thee without ceasing, glory in thy perfect love". So, as the spirit of Pentecost breathes new hope into our hearts; as we approach summer, the longest day and the prospect of holidays, let us praise God, be thankful for all we have and keep in our prayers those who have yet to know his grace and love. When 1 first St came to Barnabas I was struck by the sense of place and continuity which came from the fact that many of the congregation had been born in the area and had been part of St Barnabas all their lives, as had generations before them. Judy was one such person. rooted and grounded in St Barnabas.

She regular Church was а member and often read the lesson, particularly at Evensong. but it was after her retirement that she felt able to fully herself Church immerse in She activities. helped with Messy Church and Open the Book. She went into school to listen to the children read, she led "Seven UP". She joined Lent and Advent study groups .

Sadly, she was diagnosed with breast cancer and had to pause

all her involvement briefly while stoically underwent she treatment. As she recovered. she picked up the reins of all that she was doing before and she and Chris became the Church Eco-reps. working hard to achieve first the Bronze Eco-Church award and then the Silver award. When the need arose, she and Chris stepped into the very demanding role of Church Treasurer.

Again, tragedy struck when she found that the cancer had spread, this time to her bones. making her favourite pastimes of ballroom dancing and walking difficult. Again, she adapted to the new treatment reaime without fuss and joined in with as many activities a she was able Then Covid struck and as to. immune-suppressed. she was this meant isolation for her and Chris. Again she auickly

adapted and joined in with as much as she could online, including Open the Book on "Teams".

She and Chris bought a Camper Van so that as restrictions lifted they could drive to a local beauty spot and go for walks and enjoy the natural world while remaining self-sufficient.

Gradually, Judy felt able to return to Church in person and she started and completed the course to become an ALM in Evangelism.

In September 2022, conditions had improved enough for her to feel able to return to Open the Book in person and to join the Eco-group at St Barnabas School. Again, as the need arose, she stepped in and took on the role of PCC secretary.

In the Spring of this year, her illness finally caught up with her. I miss her personally for all her support and encouragement and for her bringing order out of my chaotic approach to things. Her hard work, quiet positivity, faithful witness and service are missed by us all. Our hearts and prayers go out to Chris who supported her in so much that she did.

May she rest in peace. *Sue Sykes*

## **BISHOP JOHN'S REFLECTIONS**

Bishop John reflects on his experience of the Coronation of King Charles III.

God save the King! Long Live the King! We shouted. What a spectacle was the coronation. They don't happen very often: there were only three in the 19th Century, four in the 20th and this is of course the first in this century.

I was privileged to have a ringside seat, not as the 113th Bishop of Worcester but in my most esoteric role, that of Lord High Almoner to the King.

The theme of the coronation was service. More moving for me than all the wonderful music, glorious though it was, was the sentence with which the whole thing began, spoken by a young chorister: his mother, is someone who has taken to heart the words and actions of Jesus and given such unstinting Christian service all his life: service to all, regardless of colour or creed.

The coronation was a great occasion, an amazing spectacle of pomp and pageantry but at its heart was our King dedicating his life in service to the King of kings. My prayer is the same one that King Charles knelt to pray before the altar during the coronation.

God of compassion and mercy whose Son was sent not to be served but to serve, give grace that I might find in thy service perfect freedom and in that freedom knowledge of thy truth. Grant that I may be a blessing to all thy children, of every faith and belief, that together we may discover the ways of gentleness and be led into the paths of peace, through Jesus Christ our Lord.

Amen.


Sue Martyr stepped down from the Deanery Synod after many years service and Mary James finished nine years as a Church Warden leaving Rachel Chalmers to serve another year.
