#### **COUNTERING THE AUTUMN BLUES**



When the cricket season ends, and the bag of kit needs to be stowed away in the loft till next year, my heart sinks a bit.

When in early September the Diocese is already flagging up the C of E's Christmas programme, "Follow the Star", my heart sinks a bit more.

When the leaves on the trees begin to turn, and the first ones fall, my heart sinks a bit more.

When unstoppably the days just get shorter, and it's darker longer every day, and the duvet goes back on the bed in place of the lighter summer counterpane, my heart sinks still further.

Of course no one should be surprised. SAD is a real condition. Seasonal affective



disorder is a form of depression. For one of our good friends, it is one important reason why he and his wife choose to live separately in different continents for more than half the year.

So? Can we enter in to this new season of autumn more positively?

French philosopher and writer Albert Camus wrote: "Autumn is a second spring when every leaf is a flower." Mmm, I like that.



In 1819 the poet John Keats calls it a "season of mists and mellow fruitfulness".



Certainly our own garden is proving more fruitful just now than at any point in the summer. The runner beans were late starting, but are now flowering



and cropping profusely. We've had more cucumbers than ever, some of the beetroot are simply ginormous! Tomatoes have ripened on the vine, and the second raspberry crop is well under way. So, thumbs up!

A recent Church Times article discusses a new book by American professor Andrew Root and a colleague, in which they discuss the challenge of trying to halt what most would see as a continuing depressing crisis of decline in the Church of England (and in the US)..

The problem with strategies for combating decline, Root argues, is that they belong to the secular age. Driven by the logic that we must speed up or die, that "more" is the alternative to extinction, these strategies demand that we schedule more activity. The danger is that this blinds us to see what God is doing" Dr Root says.

"We believe God continues to act in the world, and because God acts in the world, we believe it is possible for the Church to flourish," the authors write. Citing the beginning of the Acts of the Apostles, in which "God is the hero, and the Church waits", they invite churches to adopt a position of "waiting in a ready stance".

In other words, perhaps the solution to the Autumn blues is standing back, and relaxing into "the season of mists and mellow fruitfulness".

At many points in the Bible, the words "but God" almost jump out at us. For example: "My health may fail, and my spirit may grow weak, but God remains the strength of my heart; he is mine for ever" [Psalm 73.26]

Or another verse, wonderfully reassuring, which jumps out (from the book of Lamentations!) but mav be more deeply embedded as many of us have sung it over the years: "The steadfast love of the Lord never ceases: his mercies never come to an end; they are new every great mornina: is faithfulness." [Lamentations 3.22 -231

Really it's about *letting go, and letting God* be God. Things may look difficult, and the future gloomy, but God is the One whose love and forgiveness

.. letting go, letting God have no limits. God is the One who is able to work amid death and disaster and despondency to bring hope and transformation and new life. He (or she!) is still active and always powerfully at work.

Letting go.. I'm certainly going to give it a try.
