CHRIST THE LORD IS RISEN TODAY!

There are two moments that I speak about resurrection in my working life as a parish priest.

The first is in these great days of Easter. I love to think of the resurrection as the dangerous rumour. And I love to be a subversive voice helping keep that dangerous rumour alive and well in our day and age. The great Alleluia has sounded for the Lord's Resurrection on Easter Day and for fifty days we celebrate that the love of God for us in Jesus has always been unstoppable. For Jesus' friends and family, death really had grabbed and snatched him away from them

The cross of Good Friday seemed to be the final word. They were going only to tend to his grave. Nothing more to be said. They didn't realise it at the

time but the very real pain and struggle of Good Friday was giving them a glimpse of eternity. because even as he died, Jesus was absorbing all the darkness that gathered around him, even around us, soaking it up like a sponge, and taking it away to the God that Jesus called Abba. Father. The darkness broke him. but it also broke itself. Even the tomb they had gone to take care of is broken. Life has dealt losses like that for all of us. hasn't it, and yet, I remain convinced of something though anything, in that in moment, in any circumstance, there is blessing to be found, to give and to receive. There are voices faith of in everv generation that tell the same story that in the midst of loss and darkness, God is present.

Mary was one of the closest

friends Jesus had. That first Easter Sunday morning, Mary thinks the tomb has been ransacked, vandalised. This is a blow so final that she can take no more. And yet, this is

precisely when resurrection caught up with her. Resurrection was waiting for her, you see. And so gently, and by name, Jesus comes to her and gave her a glimpse of the new day to come.

If Easter is the first occasion. then other occasion on which I speak about resurrection is at funerals. The experience COVID us of reminded importance of giving those we love the very best farewell that we can. Neither of my parents, both in their 90s, were able to have anything near а conventional funeral day. Barbara died in June 2020, and there were just four at the graveside, no indoor service. and Chris and I weren't even able to be present. Malcolm died six months and a day later, and at least we were able to give him a send off, of sorts. Only a handful more were able to join us, but at least I was there that second time. We took him one last time to а midweek communion service, and from there to join my mother. This Easter season I want to invite you to do something subversive.

Make an appointment to come



and see me. Let's chat about a vitally significant topic --- your funeral, your plans, your wishes, your fears, your hopes. It is not morbid but one of the most lifegiving conversations that you

can have. Every time we gather for a funeral, this same Jesus, the Lord of Easter Morning, comes to call us by name too, with his pledge that because of his resurrection everything has changed. He comes to give us a glimpse of eternity.

Resurrection will catch up with us. Resurrection promises us that everything that can be redeemed, will be redeemed, everything that can be healed, will be healed, everything that can be restored will be restored. And do you know why? Because that's what resurrection does. It redeems us, it heals us, it restores us, it brings us back to ourselves. Resurrection will catch up with us.

THE ROYAL MAUNDY SERVICE 2024 WORCESTER CATHEDRAL

The Maundy annual Royal Service will he comina Worcester on Thursday 28 March when Her Majesty The Queen will be distributing the Royal Maundy gifts on behalf of His Maiesty The at Worcester Cathedral. Kina Ceremonial coins will presented to 75 men and 75 women from around the country. including 39 people from our own diocese covering Worcestershire and Dudley. The gift is presented in recognition of their exemplary Christian service to church and community over many years.

The tradition of presenting alms on Maundy Thursday goes back to at least the 4th Century and in this country, the first record of The Monarch doing it is in 1213. In recent times it has been the tradition for the service to travel to different cathedrals and it last took place in Worcester in 1980.

The service last vear attended by The King and Queen and was held at York Minster. The number of men and women receiving the Maundy Money is equivalent to the Monarch's age. For the purpose of the service, our Cathedral will become Chapel Royal with the Chapel Royal Choir singing alongside the Cathedral choir.

As Lord High Almoner, Bishop John will accompany HM The Queen as she presents the gifts. He said:

It is an honour to be able to welcome HM The Queen to Worcester. This is an immensely special service and I know it will mean a huge amount to those who have been chosen to receive the coins, all of whom will have given years of service to their local communities.

Worcester Cathedral's Interim Dean, Canon Stephen Edwards, said:

We are delighted that Worcester has been chosen as the location for this year's Royal Maundy service. We will be pulling out all the stops to create a special occasion for all the recipients.

The Maundy service will take place in the morning and will be attended bν invited representatives from across the diocese and county, including the recipients and their guests. The word 'Maundy' comes from the Latin word meaning 'Commandment'. It was on this Thursday, the day before he that Jesus gave disciples what he described as a new commandment: that vou



should love one another as I have loved you. Among the recipients of 'Maundy Money' from HM the Queen at the Cathedral

is our own John Dentith who was the Diocesan Secretary to Advisory Committee for the Care of Church Buildings for 16 years, supporting churches looking to make changes to their buildings. He has been a member of St Barnabas with Christ Church in Worcester since 1985, serving in range of roles including churchwarden, Secretary and Lay Chair of the PCC. He is still the representative Diocesan on Synod.

John said: I couldn't believe it when I received the letter. It is such an honour and I was very touched. I am excited about being at the service.



New Hope was established by Jean Wilson, a mother of a young daughter with severe learning disabilities.

The need for the Project was identified by Jean when she could not find suitable specialist daytime respite for her daughter, Emily. She thought there must be other parents and carers in Worcestershire who experiencing the same difficulty in finding a service which was open every school holiday and every Saturday throughout the year. As a result she sought the opinions of other parents/carers professionals. and As expected there was, indeed, a need for a new innovated project.

With the help and support of the (then) Worcester Community having leasing her their building of the new unused Community Housing office in the centre of Ronkswood rent-free, and donations from the Round Table, Mencap, Tesco and the lottery, the New Hope project started on the 28th July 2010.

New Hope has grown in size and need since 2012 and now caters for children aged 6 – 19 years who have profound learning disabilities and complex health issues. It is open to all families who need the support and care of New Hope for the children throughout Worcestershire.

The facilities at New Hope include a multi-sensory room, an art and craft area and a ball pit, a television room and a cooking area outside.. There is a large play area and a sensory garden, and an area where the children can plant and grow flowers and vegetables.

In November 2012 the charity New Hope Worcestershire was established to fund-raise for the work that is carried out for the children.

The aims of New Hope are:

- 1. to provide a happy, safe, warm and stimulating environment for all children to play, learn and develop freely,
- to respect every child as an individual regardless of gender, cultural background and ability.

Jean and her team of paid workers and volunteers finance the centre by seeking available grants, charitable giving from the community, holding jumble sales, raffles, social evenings, and their shop in the centre of Ronkswood. This shop is at the hub of the Estate where people can pop in and browse for bargains and often stay and chat to the staff.

New Hope needs donations for the shop of clothing, bric-a-brac toys, baby equipment, unused toiletries, in fact anything they can sell or use for, example, raffle prizes, tombolas and items for a stall at local fêtes.

The shop is open Monday to Friday from 10am – 3pm, and Saturday 10am – 1pm and they would welcome a visit from you.

If you have anything you would like to donate to the New Hope shop if ytou bring them into church I will deliver it to the shop, or if you phone me on 07397 233144 I could collect your donation from your home. Any donations that can be sold in the shop for more than 50p will be price-ticketed by the shop, or advertised on Ebay.

St. Barnabas, through the Mission fund, have made several donations at Christmas time to help fund Christmas parties for the children and the cost of a coach to enable the children to attend a Pantomime for which New Hope extremely are grateful. Marian Bailey
